As a psychologist Gail operates a private consultancy specialising in the IQ assessment of children and adolescents and consults to a number of schools about their testing programs and the identification and management of exceptional children who may be challenging and complex and need individual education programs developed.

Gail's involvement in the gifted field started some 20 years ago. She has been involved with the CHIP Foundation since 1989 and was elected Chairperson in 2001, a role she still holds.

After completing a Master of Education (1992) in curriculum differentiation, and a Graduate Diploma in Counselling (1995), Gail was awarded a Doctorate in Psychology in 2002 for her research into the levels of academic achievement and underachievement in a group of 50 children with IQs ranging between 125 and 200. Gail is sought after as a speaker on giftedness, underachievement and testing; has completed a DEET project on giftedness and has authored a number of papers on exceptional children.

As a registered psychologist, practising teacher and parent of two gifted children (now adults) she has developed a quite unique understanding of intellectual giftedness.

"Spot The Difference - A Practical Approach To Differentiation For Gifted Children"

When I go to my Pilates class, the teacher gives us a huge range of options and encourages us to work at our own level. This is the standard practice for this teacher; not a special occurrence. Naturally we all work at our own pace and level because we all have such different needs. This is not unlike differentiation in the classroom. It needs to be the way we teach all the time and if done properly, will cater suitably for all students. This is readily accepted for children with learning disabilities and also needs to be implemented for gifted students. The government plans to implement this national curriculum next year.

The Giant Classroom - resources for History, Geography and Science

In 1992, the savvy Tasmanian company Giant Classroom was formed to allow students from Australia and New Zealand to interact with each other in a contemporary, friendly and educational shared online environment.

"It is the goal of Giant Classroom to engage students on a global learning platform so that they can become more informed of relevant issues around the world, and more culturally aware," says David Reid, former teacher and founder of Giant Classroom. "We are also interested in rewarding the development of research, analysis and interpretive skills rather than pure rote memorisation."

Giant Classroom programs include The Great Race, the Asia-Wise Competition, the Science Challenge and the Primary Research Project, which are tailored for both primary and secondary school students. The programs encourage thorough investigation into areas of history, science, geography and studies of society and environment (SOSE) in enjoyable ways, and offer various levels of competition. Content is produced by local teachers, and has in the past involved collaboration with institutions such as the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO). Success has been wide-spread, with the Asia-Wise Competition engaging over 20,000 students per year from Australia and New Zealand.

Teachers have also found Giant Classroom's innovative programs hugely successful in helping to alleviate their workloads. These primarily self-directed learning tools steer students to access questions, submit answers and receive reports online, meaning that there is no preparation or marking required from the teacher. The programs allow ideal flexibility as they can be accessed throughout the school year from any location, and can act just as effectively as homework tasks or as extra projects for accelerated learners.

"Another wonderful education resource that has been both enjoyable and challenging," says the deputy principal of St Joseph's College in New South Wales, of the Primary Research Project, "the event was such a buzz."



FROM SALLY-ANNE McCORMACK

It's been a big year for the WebPsychologist practice so far. On Thursday March 18th, my first book (Stomp Out The ANTs) is being launched in Balwyn by ADAVIC.



ANTs (Automatic Negative Thoughts) are annoying creatures that trouble everyone! This simple guide is effective due to its content and the practical writing style of the author, and can be referred to by anyone who is dealing with a plague of ANTs!

Sally-Anne describes the analogy of the ANTs - everyone gets them, they are hard to get rid of, and we often don't notice them until there is a huge pile of black pests hiding all of the good things underneath them. She describes some popular strategies to "stomp" out the ANTs, and ways of helping yourself to prevent future infestations!

If you have ever been anxious, depressed, or had any negative thoughts, then this book is for you!

We had a small "preliminary" book launch with Gifted Resources in Croydon which was an informal and intimate introduction to this book (*incidentally, Jo Freitag is currently reading over my next book which is about parenting gifted children!*). Soon we will have EVERYONE stomping!!!,

In addition, I have tentatively pencilled in some dates for the Stomp Out The ANTs program for Year 5 & 6 children. It is a 6 week program for 10 - 12 year olds to teach them skills and strategies to help them to prevent depression and anxiety. Research shows that these preventative programs can have a protective factor for children years afterwards. Remember, for those with a Mental Health Care Plan, some of these sessions are partially rebatable through Medicare!

The dates are Wednesdays from the 21st April to 26th May at 5pm for one hour in Blackburn. Jo Freitag, please forward this information on to other interested parents and let me know in the next few weeks if you would like to book in. FROM DERRIN CRAMER THINKING AHEAD W.A.

As I mentioned in the newsletter recently, this year I am planning to offer gifted kids whose schools don't run the program the chance to be involved in the Future Problem Solving Program through Thinking Ahead. This is a great program that is particularly suited to gifted kids and gives them the opportunity to develop critical and creative thinking skills, as well as research and communication skills while investigating multiple aspects of a future based topic. As they work in small teams (4 or 5 students) it is a chance to develop team work skills with like minds. Have a look at some more information about the program and the sorts of skills your child would develop through being involved via this link.

The coaching sessions will take place on Wednesday afternoons and will be held in the library at Nedlands Primary School (selected as it provides a fairly central venue) from 4.00 until 5.30pm. Cost will be \$22 per week and will be invoiced by the term (rather than paid week by week). The number of sessions varies slightly each term and further details can be found on the Thinking Ahead website at www.thinkingahead.com.au/fps.htm
If your child was part of a team who qualified to attend the National Competition there would be extra costs involved in travelling to Melbourne to compete.

Coaching sessions will be held on the following dates:

Term 1 - March 10, 17, 24, 31.

Term 2 - April 21, 28. May 5, 12, 19, 26. June 2, 9, 16, 23, 30

Term 3 – July 28, August 4th

Students who qualified for the National Competition would need to attend 5 additional training sessions will be held on Sept 1, 8, 15 and 22 (Term 3) and October 13th (Term 4) prior to travelling to Melbourne to compete October 15 – 17th.

The first session will be held on **March 10**th. While registrations may be able to be accepted after this date, we do need a minimum of 10 students for this program to go ahead so please do register early.

I have had a couple of queries about whether you can come along to 'try it out'. As it has taken a while to get everything in line and I will have to pay the team registrations prior to our start date, it won't be possible this year to have a try out session. However, if your child comes to the first session and then really does not want to continue, please let me know. If we still have sufficient numbers for the teams registered, I can just invoice you for the first session. (If not, I would have to invoice you for more than one session to cover the cost of team registration, unless we had some late comers. Please don't consider this option unless you are prepared to be flexible with regard to the cost involved)

The coach for the team will be Liberty Cramer, a young lady who is a registered coach and has also completed the evaluator's course. Liberty was involved with FPS as a co-curricular program for her last 3 years of high school years and with her team qualified to attend the national competition twice. Since then she has been involved with coaching teams of girls at Penrhos College. She is currently studying a Law/Arts degree at UWA. You may have spoken to Liberty on the phone, or met her when she was supervising holiday programs at various times over the last few years.

I can highly recommend the Future Problem Solving Program. I consider FPS to be one of the most valuable things my own daughters have done in their school years and apart from widening their world view I have seen then transfer the skills they learned into other areas of life, particularly to situations where problem solving is needed, but also in structuring their thinking (which has been useful in essay writing). My younger daughter is just starting her 6th year of involvement with FPS and so far has qualified for the national competition 3 times (once as an individual) and despite the workload of Year 12 has elected not to drop it from her co-curricular program. Digital Citizenship and the thinking student

Bloom's Digital Taxonomy attempts to account for the new behaviours and actions emerging as technology advances and becomes more ubiquitous.

These technologies include Web 2.0 technologies and increasingly personal and cloud computing. Bloom's Digital Taxonomy isn't about the tools or technologies rather, it is about using these to facilitate learning. The communication skills covered range from texting and instant messaging to debating, negotiating, moderating and collaborating. These skills are associated with the range of thinking skills from lower order to the higher order thinking skills. In this new cyberworld students need to learn about digital citizenship and thinking.

About the Presenter

Jess McCulloch has spent the last three years working with various Web 2.0 technologies to make her classes more interactive, collaborative and creative. These technologies have enabled her to work with particular interest in extending gifted and talented students in her classes.
