
GERRIC Student Programs Placements Released

Of particular interest is a wonderful program for highly able creative/artistic children at the **National Gallery of Victoria** on August 1st and 8th, '*Magnificent Masters*'

This program is based on artworks from the magnificent collection of the **Museo del Prado, Madrid**. This exhibition of over one hundred works presents a rich selection of paintings and drawings spanning 300 years of Italian art, from the early sixteenth to the eighteenth centuries. More than seventy artists are represented including Raphael, Correggio, Titian, Tintoretto, Carracci, Poussin and Tiepolo. The exhibition reflects the taste of the Spanish Royal Court whose Kings and Courtiers avidly collected Italian art. Many of these works are at the heart of the Prado's collection and have never before left Spain.

The program aims to develop children's knowledge and understanding of the lives and the artistic styles of these Italian masters. They will examine and discuss the art works across several themes, including religious stories, portraits, landscapes, historical and narrative and still life. They will learn about the importance of drawing from the figure and that artists sketched and re sketched the same sections of the body until they achieved perfection before they would they begin to paint.

Students will also participate in a series of workshops creating art works that develop and extend their ability to observe, draw and paint. Presenters will aim to teach skills in mixing colour, working with chiaroscuro, the value of symmetry and the relevance of foreground, middle and back ground as compositional devices. Dealing with the asynchronous and gifted child A symposium for teachers & parents

Presented by the Columbus Group!

The issues...

All of us want to see gifted children achieve and succeed. We *want* them to reach the heights they are capable of.

But all of us who live with or work directly with gifted children know that there is more, much more, to being gifted – and, ultimately, to success - than simply gaining the highest grades in school, the excellences in NCEA, more, even, than the Honours degree at university.

These are the children who confound all our expectations of what children will know, think or do, the children who astound us with their insights and their questions, delight us with their quirky humour, awe us at times with their concern for the hurts of others. And these are the children who so often find it difficult to fit into school, who are so often frustrated and disillusioned by what school has to offer,



who are so often the odd one out amongst all the others.

Giftedness, we learn from our interaction with them, is something that impacts, not just on the scores the child gets in school, but on the *whole being* of the child. It's complex!And yet the whole thrust of our official education system seems increasingly to be towards only what is measurable and standardised – for gifted children, conformity with norms well below their capability, and no recognition of all that it means to a child in so many ways to be different from most other children. It is, to say the least, a narrow and inadequate vision of what education should be.

Finding answers....

While there are some even within gifted education itself whose focus is solely on "talent development", some of the most prestigious figures in the field have always argued for a wider "whole child" view, beginning with Leta Stetter Hollingworth in the 1920's and continuing on in the work of people like Annemarie Roeper, Linda Silverman, Stephanie Tolan and Michael Piechowski. In 1991, several of the leading proponents of this view came together at a meeting in Columbus, Ohio, to draft a new definition of giftedness that would help to convey to parents, educators and officials the reality of the gifted experience. It seemed to them that one of the most significant and often unrecognised consequences of giftedness was that it led to *asynchronous* development. In other words, while the child might be highly advanced in some areas of learning, the same child could be at a more average level in other aspects of development, or even delayed, particularly in social development through lack of contact with like others. When this uneven development is combined with the heightened intensity with which gifted children react to experience, it creates enormous stresses and tensions for the child and for parents and teachers, all of whom (including the child) may be bewildered by these apparent contradictions. The definition the Columbus Group wrote to explain this situation reads as follows:

Giftedness is *asynchronous development* in which advanced cognitive abilities and heightened intensity combine to create inner experiences and awareness that are qualitatively different from the norm. This asynchrony increases with higher intellectual capacity. The

uniqueness of the gifted renders them particularly vulnerable and requires modifications in parenting, teaching and counseling in order for them to develop optimally.

The members of the Columbus Group, all eminent researchers, practitioners and writers, have continued to work individually and in collaboration to advance our understanding of giftedness. Their research and their experience continue to illuminate our thinking. Their definition has had a powerful influence on the development of gifted education. It has helped countless teachers and parents to gain a better comprehension of what it means to be a gifted child. But, frustratingly, there are still many who have not heard of it, including, it would seem, those who determine our education policies.

Imagine we could bring the whole Columbus Group to New Zealand. Imagine if all of us, parents and teachers and even Ministry officials, could hear at firsthand their insights and knowledge, could talk face-to-face with these world experts, could ask them directly the questions we're burning to ask! What an impact this could have on gifted policies and practice in New Zealand!
